#### 1.0 Reference: Exhibit B-1, General

1.1 Does the FEU agree that in the event that the BCUC approves the instant application and the FEU subsequently relocates data and the servers that store the data to the United States, that US legislation and regulation, both existing laws and regulations and laws and regulations implemented in the future, would take primacy over Canadian legislation and regulation in the event that US and Canadian interests were in conflict? If not, please explain why not.

1.2 In FEU's view, what would be the impact of denial of the application (i) on ratepayers and (ii) on FEU's operations? Please quantify where possible.

#### Response:

In the Application, the FEU have explained the potential impact. For instance, on page 5, the Companies explained:

"Today, the current data/server geographical location restriction prevents the FEU from considering any third-party service provider that results in data or software being hosted on servers outside Canada. The FEU should be able to consider all feasible and applicable hosted options when new products are evaluated or existing systems are upgraded to find a solution that best fits the FEU's business and services to customers. Moreover, the restrictions on the FEU may hinder opportunities for investment in information systems, software, service providers, and technology platforms which may result in benefits for customers as well as cost savings."

However, it is not possible to quantify the impact to ratepayers and operations at this time as the Companies, due to the existing restriction, have not explored the potential opportunities. When the needs do arise, the Companies want to be in a position, and will endeavor, to find a solution that not only meets the needs of the business and addresses all the FEU requirements, but is also cost effective. In general, cost savings can translate to beneficial rate reductions for ratepayers.



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1.3 In this application, is the FEU claiming a <u>need</u> to remove locational restrictions with respect to data storage and servers?

#### Response:

In the Application, the FEU has identified four main reasons to support the removal of the restriction because it is no longer necessary and creates potential impairment for the Companies to seek the best technological solutions for its business functions. As stated in the response to BCOAPO IR 1.1.2, when the need arises, the Companies want to be in a position to find appropriate solutions that meet business needs, even though at this time there is no immediate specific application or technological solution that requires the remove of locational restrictions with respect to data storage and servers.



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## 2.0 Reference: Exhibit B-1, page 5, Talent Sourcing

2 The referenced page states:

In addition, many of the vendors that the FEU may wish to use for services other than technology services may have servers located outside of Canada. For example, if the FEU wished to engage a talent sourcing firm we would be restricted to those firms which store all data on Canadian servers and accordingly, the FEU has been faced with restrictions on which vendors can be retained for various services.

2.1 Given that the restriction from which the FEU seeks relief applies to utility data, please explain why any talent sourcing firm that FEU wished to engage is restricted to "those firms which store all data on Canadian servers ...."
