



Teacher's Guide for FortisBC 60-second videos and A Few Minutes for Safety

Video #1: Call Before You Dig

- 1. Several situations in which someone might want to dig a hole on a piece of property are:
 - a. when creating a garden
 - b. when installing a radio tower (requires a hole at least 1.5 metres deep)
 - c. when building a new addition to a home
 - d. to create a compost area
 - e. other appropriate answers
- 2. You should contact BC One Call **before** digging.

Video #2: Get Rid of that Stink

- 3. The son suspected that the smell was a natural gas leak.
- 4. These are some safety precautions you should follow if you think there is a gas leak:
 - a. Do not turn on or turn off any electrical switches (including light switches) or appliances. Do not use a phone or cell phone.
 - b. Open the doors and windows wide (to reduce the concentration of any possible gas inside the building).
 - c. Immediately exit the building.
 - d. Dial 9-1-1 or 1-800-663-9911.
- 5. A natural gas leak smells like rotten eggs. This odour is added to the gas supply so that leaks can be detected.

Video #3: Look Up and Live

- 6. The message the boy read on the warning sign was: Danger Electrical Hazard Keep Out.
- 7. The sign also carried the following information: FortisBC. For emergencies call 1-866-4FORTIS (1-866-436-7847).

8. The title of this video reflects the fact that power lines are located above us, where we often do not look at or consider them.

Video #4: Safety Masters

- 9a. You should stay at least 10 metres away from a downed power line.
- 9b. 10 metres = 30 feet (approximately).
- 10. The mystery safety issue described in this video is the smell of a gas leak.
 - b. When the girl discovered the mystery safety issue she ran outside and then called the emergency number. **Note**: you should be as far away from the building (and the gas leak) as possible.

Video #5: Urban Jungle Hunter Safety Masters

- 11. The two general locations where power lines are found are overhead and buried in the ground.
- 12. The approximate striking range of a downed power line is 10 metres.
- 13. If you see a downed power line, you should call FortisBC.
- 14. If you are within the 10-metre danger zone near a downed power line, you should maintain contact between your feet and the ground by shuffling away backwards (keeping your eyes on the downed power line).

Video #6: A Few Minutes for Safety

- 15. Energy safety is important in many locations such as home, work, indoor public places (such as a shopping mall or stadium) and outdoor public places (such as a soccer field).
- 16. If a downed power line falls on your vehicle (such as during a wind storm) stay in the vehicle if it is safe to do so.
- 17. You stay at least 10 metres away from a downed power line.
- 18. If you have to get out of a car that has a downed power line nearby, take these precautions:
 - a. Keep your body compact.
 - b. Hold loose clothing tightly against your body.
 - c. Do not use a cell phone until you are at least 10 metres away (not mentioned in the video).
 - d. Jump from the vehicle.
 - e. Shuffle your feet as you move away (so that you maintain contact with the ground).
 - f. When you are at least 10 metres away, call 9-1-1 or FortisBC (1-800-663-9911 for a gas leak and 1-866-436-7847 for a downed power line).
- 19. You should call BC One Call before you dig because there is a danger of hitting a gas line or buried electrical power line.
- 20. A house painter or roofer, working near an overhead power line, could accidentally touch the line with a tool or ladder, causing electrocution.

- 21. If you smell a gas leak, ensure that you and everyone else exit the building. Then call FortisBC.
- 22. The emergency numbers you should call are:
 - a. for a downed power line: 9-1-1 or 1-866-436-7847
 - b. for a natural gas leak: 9-1-1 or 1-800-663-9911
 - c. before digging in the ground: 1-800-474-6866 (or *6886 on a cell phone).
- 23. Students will use a mind map to summarize the safety steps required when spotting a downed power line or smelling a gas leak or before digging in the ground.
